Sunday 18th October was the feast day of Luke. In my sermon on that day I considered what it means to give our lives to God as a living sacrifice, just as had St Luke and his companions, who had been sent out by Jesus like "lambs among wolves". Jesus asked that they leave their current situations, leave behind all their possessions and go out with only what God had provided them. To live as Jesus did, hand to mouth not knowing where food or shelter would come. This took enormous courage, trust and great faith.

And there are times when we need to display those same qualities, of sacrifice, of subordinating our own needs and desires and having the courage to do things differently, and in doing so model the sacrificial love expected of us. We all long for things to be back to normal, to hold community events and plan Christmas activities with music and light and people everywhere. But sadly that is not to be, instead we must be creative and inventive, find new ways of doing things without putting others in danger. This year we cannot say "but this what we always done" and allow ourselves to feel lost and bereft when that is denied us, but must instead recognise the command to leave behind what we had and trust that God will give us what we need. We will keep our Christmas schedule of services, if permitted, knowing they will be different but that the joy and love will still be present, it is after all love that God gives us when we have nothing and it is love above all we share with our communities.

It will be a different Advent and Christmas season this year and as we prepare for it we need to remember the best gift we can give is to keep each other safe.

Okjokull- remember the name.

In western Iceland there is a glacier called Okjokull. It is the first of the country's glaciers to be completely lost to climate change, and was officially declared "dead" in 2014, when it was no longer thick enough to flow across the landscape as it had done for centuries. A plaque was installed next to it in 2019, written in Icelandic and English, as a letter to the future. It reads:



The memorial also carries the words "415 ppm CO2" which was the measure of atmospheric carbon dioxide in 2019, higher than at any point since humans have lived on the earth. At the start of the industrial revolution it was about 280 ppm. By 1958 it was 315 ppm. IN THE NEXT 200 YEARS ALL OUR GLACIERS ARE EXPECTED TO FOLLOW THE SAME PATH. THIS MONUMENT IS TO ACKNOWLEDGE THAT WE KNOW WHAT IS HAPPENING AND WHAT NEEDS TO BE DONE. ONLY YOU KNOW IF WE DID IT.
