Some of you may know that I am interested in canals and enjoy travelling the waterways of England and Wales by narrowboat. In order to do so successfully one requires a map, be it electronic, paper or in book form. The fascinating thing about any map of our canal system is that it looks familiar but none of the place names make any sense, who apart from those involved with canals has heard of Hawkesbury Junction, Fradley Junction, Stoke Bruerne and so on? Today they are so small and insignificant that you would be hard put to find them on any ordinary general purpose road map, yet apart from having excellent pubs they were all once very important places, vital for the linking up of waterways and the shipment of goods across 18<sup>th</sup> century England.



It has occurred to me that this map and indeed the very act of travelling our waterways is very like what it is to be a Christian today. We follow a different path to that of many people, side by side with others but encountering different challenges and at a different speed.

There is a spot on the canal system, at Watford Gap, where both the M1 motorway and the west coast mainline closely parallel the Grand Union Canal. The canal was there first of course. Many of you will have passed that way, usually so quickly that you were totally unaware that the canal and its boats travelling at 4 miles an hour were there, their crews observing the hustle and bustle of motorway traffic and high speed train travel with profound gratitude that they had time to think, to pause and take a breath. That they were travelling through a beautiful green corridor alive with God's creation. Instead of dominating God's creation with power and speed they had the time to be at one with it. For us, this meant time to observe the ducklings, to feed a male swan who refused to eat our offerings unless hand fed, to make friends with a busy little moorhen feeding her brood. But there were other experiences too, helping other boaters through locks, making friends with those moored next to you, sharing equipment, laughing with each other. Things that in our busy world we often do not have time for. Our maps led us here, to these experiences and little known places, just as following Jesus leads us to the experience of loving and sharing, to experiencing his world with awe and gratitude, to having time for prayer and reflection.

We can't all travel by narrowboat, but we can all follow that strange map laid down for us by Jesus, to follow his path of love, slowly, so that we are open to new experiences and insights, deepening our understanding of what it means to go into the unknown as we spread the news of God's love to those who have not yet glimpsed the map and its path of truth. That is God's gift to us all. Pam Walker

Pauline McDonnell (1946 – 2018) was a valued and highly engaged member of the Belsay/Bolam community for over thirty years. Born in Gateshead as the oldest of two girls, she married her husband Eddie in 1966 Right from the start when she and Eddie moved in to Rose Cottage in 1982 with their then young children, Helen & Stephen, she made an impact.

Pauline was active with the school and for many years on the PCC. She served as a churchwarden and was a vital part of the St Andrew's community.

### 'Soon we'll be without the moon...'

The agenda for the Newcastle Diocesan Synod in April was unusual.

Times of change seem to trigger unusual events and we often only realise that change is upon us with the occurrence of something odd. While the relationship of our strange Spring weather to climate change may be debatable, there is no doubt about the cause of the inclusion by Bishop's Council of a Contingency Budget in Synod's agenda for April. The first quarter figures for 2018 suggest we will be short by £390,000 by the end of the year.

The inescapable and awkward fact is that Newcastle Diocese has been living beyond its means for decades, and getting away with it by using the National Church Grant (around £1.4m) to balance the books. But since Renewal and Reform, the National Church Grant has been re-structured and reduced and its purpose has been defined much more tightly: to support ministry and mission in our poorest communities/ parishes (the Lowest Income Community Fund or LICF). So now we can no longer just pop LICF into the Income and Expenditure Account and use the portion that is unspent on the poorest Parishes, to balance the books.

Bishop's Council couldn't face the music in 2017 and in the glaring absence of any debates at Synod about expenditure priorities, affordability or income, decided to try and balance the books by requesting 100% payment of Parish Share. Our best Share contribution to date has been 93%, so it is no surprise that in the first quarter of 2018 our new Director of Finance recognised both the 7% shortfall and that there may be trouble ahead.

There has still been no debate at Synod about what our financial priorities should be. This is particularly regrettable since the main cut in the Contingency Budget is to parish stipendiary posts. There will be five fewer posts funded for the rest of 2018.

Paid Parish ministry, in all its forms, should be the last thing to go, not the first cut. Bishop's Council should have faced up to the need to reduce expenditures that are not critical to Parish mission, such as all the 'Bishop's Advisers'; giving grants to other bodies. Why is the independent Education Board given £150,000 when it has reserves of its own of over £1m?

We need to stand up for the primacy of Parish ministry. It is a truism that the Church of England is a clergy led church. It is paradoxically senior clergy who are threatening to undermine Parish ministry.

### **'CROSS PURPOSES – across the World'** Easter Trail 2018


Many thanks to all who helped us with our fifth Easter Trail focussed on the Passion of Christ, hosted this year within the beautiful mediaeval church of St Mary Magdalene in Whalton village. A series of interactive and experiential stations were set in the ancient church describing the Easter Story in some depth, pondering upon the mystery of God's love that Jesus showed us. We also looked at some of the tensions that he set up during his earthly ministry.

The church was open daily for three weeks for visitors to come and experience the trail. Music was played and explanatory booklets were available for those who wished to explore the story in greater depth.



We worked with over 300 children from the six schools of Whalton, Longhorsley, Belsay, Cambo, The Priory School, Hexham and All Saints', Morpeth. Each school came to us for their school day and were split into small groups, guided around the church, and provided with a range of related art, craft and musical activities in the village hall. We were most grateful that we were assisted by over forty volunteers, and with much careful planning we engaged the children in their learning. We used some 'Godly Play', wove in the schools' core values and covered some important aspects of their curriculum.

Participation in the Easter Trail over the last five years has not only stimulated further contact with these schools but also publicity drew in both visitors and new









All the expenses associated with this event were kindly funded by our donors.

Last year we staged a Trail 'Walking with the Northern Saints', a 'Resurrection Trail' in 2016, and Passion Trails in 2014 and 2015. We started with some material from 'Experience Easter' as it has grown hugely since then. These trails have become an important piece of Mission and Ministry in these rural parts.

### Year 5 - Premier League Schools Tournament 2017-18 Northumberland Schools



We were delighted to be invited to take part in the **Newcastle United Foundation Regional Qualifiers** for the Premier League Schools Tournament on Tuesday 23<sup>rd</sup> January. The event was organised by Newcastle United Foundation with the winners of the Regional Finals going on to represent Newcastle United FC at the National Grand Finals.

A total of 8 teams, each representing their school, competed on the 4G pitches at Cramlington Learning Village. Unfortunately we didn't qualify for the next round but we did have a terrific time playing against teams with a variety of different levels of skill. The atmosphere was fabulous and it was an extremely positive experience for all, with fantastic coaching and refereeing from the Newcastle United Foundation.

Science Show



On Wednesday 14<sup>th</sup> March our year 5 students visited Ponteland High School to watch a Science Show. We looked at different elements/theories of how the earth began. There were intervals where the students from Ponteland High School would demonstrate and explain experiments; the Northern Lights; exploding volcano; screaming jelly baby and making a hot substances similar to magma. We then looked at evolution and we were able to look and touch the different skulls of how humans have evolved to look as we do today.

### World Book Day

For World Book Day this year we decided to dress up as characters from the Bible – there were many animals from Noah's Ark together with a few Noah's, not to mention Moses and Queen Esther, Delilah, several Josephs with their technicolour dream coats and Jesus as a baby and grown man. Who would have known that there is mention of unicorns in the Bible? The children acted out the stories, to which their characters belonged and they loved sharing their fabulous array of Bibles.

### Key Stage 2 visit to Bolam Lake: Earth Magic

After Phil's visit last week when he brought in the 'magic dust bin', we were surprised to see the damage being done every day to our Earth. 'WASSAP' (Water Magic, Air Magic, Sun Magic, Soil Magic, Animal Magic and Plant Magic) was written on the bin as a clue to what our mission at Bolam Lake would entail...With the weather on our side we were raring to go on Friday morning to start our mission to become Earth Magicians; helping to save our planet. We split into two groups and participated in practical activities which looked at the water cycle; food chains; components of soil; gasses in the air; finishing off with some refection time on our 'magic spots'; taking time to notice and appreciate the wonderful world around us. The children enjoyed completing their workbooks and getting them officially signed off as part of their training. In



turn they then received a piece of coloured wool to tie around the letter on their wand (WASSAP). The children are eagerly looking forward to completing their final two areas of training at school; using and developing their skills across the curriculum to complete the Green Heart Project and help the world to become a better place.

### **Hardy Perennials**



Here are some of the perennials I have grown over the years which look a bit too exotic to handle the Northumbrian climate but have proved hardy and long lived as well as beautiful.

Morina longifolia native of the Himalayas in Kashmir where it is common in Bhutan, growing on moist but well drained steep slopes on open hillsides or in clearings in woodland at 3000-4000m. The plant has dark green thistle like leaves which have a lemon zest fragrance when rubbed. The exotic looking flowering spikes appear in mid summer and carry pale pink, almost white tubular flowers. As each flower is fertilized by bees it darkens giving contrasting light and dark flowers up the stem.

Morina grows best in full sun the soil should be moist but well drained. The plant may not survive on cold wet clay soil so incorporate some grit to aid drainage if you have this type of garden.

Plants are difficult to divide but can be raised easily from seed sown in autumn seedlings appear in the spring and can be potted up until large enough to plant out.

Paradisea lilliastrum is an elegant exotic looking plant native to alpine meadows of southern Europe. Its common name is St Bruno's lily which refers to the 11<sup>th</sup> century founder of the Carthusian order of monks whose motherhouse was in the French Alps where the plant is found. This perennial plant has a rhizomatous rootstock that slowly spreads to form a small clump. It has narrow grey-green leaves which produce long flowering spikes of white trumpet shaped flowers which have bright yellow stamens. The plant is grown mainly as an ornamental but historically it had medicinal uses. Easily raised from seed indeed will freely seed around if you don't remove the capsules.

Oenothera Crown Imperial or more commonly known as evening primrose, this long flowering perennial has an upright habit with large bowl shaped yellow flowers which emerge from red buds. Best in a sunny position in the garden with a well drained soil. Plants can be propagated by seed or dividing mature clumps in autumn or early spring.
